



Speaker 1: Frank Lloyd Wright is an architect that every educated American should be familiar with. One of his most daring works is Fallingwater, a private home built in Bear Creek, Pennsylvania, for the owner of a department store, Edgar Kaufmann. It is probably the most unique personal home created in the early part of the 20th Century that wasn't built for royalty. Frank Lloyd Wright's buildings have a very personal feeling about them. You get the sense that they were really created with people in mind, and are more organic and less industrialized when compared to other international style works.

Another icon of Frank Lloyd Wright's body of work is the Guggenheim Museum in New York City. I've included it here just to keep things cohesive, but you should know that it was built in the middle of the 20th Century and isn't really a reflection of the early 20th Century, but rather an evolution of Frank Lloyd Wright's style.

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
